As previously mentioned, in my own mind I am continuing to focus on achieving a *relatively* long feather in the hood while maintaining a shorter feather in the tail. This is far more difficult than it sounds and although progress is being made, it is at a snail's pace. Couple this with a deeper, wider body and we have our work cut out for us!

Facebook has proven to be an outstanding resource for collecting photos and comparing progress. The two areas that I see that need work in our birds is in body and also breeding ornaments that are full-feathered. I don't know a better to describe this other than simply saying, "look at the photos."

I do not know to whom the blacks pictured above belong. I measured both birds and they are roughly the same length. The bird on the right looks shorter due to the deeper, wider body but also because of the greater length of the hood feathering. This is what I am referring to when discussing shortening the tail but maintaining a longer feather in the hood. Because of the longer hood feather, the tail is <u>proportionately</u> shorter.






